Note: This Adult Rehabilitation Kit is for a new listener or a listener developing confidence with their hearing technology. If you are unsure where to start, simply begin at Level 1. All recipients will benefit from all activities, even if they seem simple at first. This helps build listening endurance and confidence.

#### How to choose a level

Level 1	The recipient is learning to discriminate words of differing syllable number.  The recipient is learning to understand words when they are at the end of a sentence and when they have differing acoustic characteristics.	The recipient needs support with activities which involve aspects of auditory and cognitive processing. Auditory memory tasks are challenging.	The recipient is working along their journey to life using a hearing implant and is developing confidence in communicating in their wider world. Level 2	The recipient is learning to discriminate words of the same syllable number with differing acoustic characteristics.  The recipient is learning to understand words when they are in multiple places in a sentence and when they have similar acoustic characteristics. # **Tips**

This material is suitable for recipients who have had their hearing device fitted or cochlear implant processor switched on for a period of two weeks or more.

Check the recipient's hearing at the beginning of every rehabilitation session using the Ling Six Sound Test.

- Find a strategy for giving the recipient instructions for each activity. You might need to write the instructions down or you can use the instructions on these pages and point to the words as you read them.
- Ensure that the recipient understands all the information that is provided throughout the session. For example, if you speak to another family member, ensure that the recipient can access what was said. It may be necessary to write it down. It is important for the recipient to be included and valued as a participant in all discussions throughout the session.
- It is often helpful to do a trial of each activity together to ensure the recipient knows what they are required to do. Building confidence in recipients is important. Remember that activities that are easy are still useful to build confidence and increase listening endurance. Do not rush to harder activities.
- When using paper or a hand to limit visual access, be sure a good auditory signal is received. Ensure the sound is not muffled by the screen.
- Remember that the activities can be tiring for the recipient. Ensure there are some breaks between activities when the recipient can relax (e.g., getting a drink of water, stretching) before beginning the next activity.
- For Hearing Lifestyle activities, easy access to information is recommended. This can be achieved by allowing access to lip-reading or by reading the information.

#### **EXPECTED OUTCOMES**

#### Level 1:

 Identifies one- to two-word answer from semi-closed set

#### Level 2:

• Identifies short answer from semi-open set

There is a list of questions and answers. The recipient has the list of questions with spaces to fill in the answers.

#### Level 1:

- 1. The recipient asks the question (e.g., "In football (soccer), which player can touch the ball?").
- 2. The speaker gives the answer.
- 3. The recipient finds the answer from the choices given.
- 4. The recipient writes down or repeats aloud the answer.

#### Level 2:

- 1. The recipient asks the question (e.g., "Which wild card player won Wimbledon?").
- 2. The speaker gives the answer.
- 3. The recipient writes down or repeats aloud the answer.

#### **MAKING MONEY**



#### **EXPECTED OUTCOMES**

Level 1 and 2:

• Completes a range of varying activities including identifying sentences of differing lengths and words of differing syllable number

The aim is to win an agreed amount of money. That amount can vary between 1,000 and 20,000. There is a range of activities. Easier activities win less money, harder activities win more.

- 1. Decide together on the amount of money aimed for.
- 2. The recipient chooses an amount from the grid and completes the relevant activity. Keep playing until the recipient has earnt the money amount wanted.

Which Sport?: the speaker says the sport, and the recipient identifies the correct one from the choice of two. Fill in the Gap: the speaker says the sentence, and the recipient fills in the missing word. Select the Word: the speaker says the word, and the recipient identifies the correct one from a choice of three. Sentence Build Up: the speaker says the sentence, and the recipient identifies the correct one from a choice of three.

#### STAYING ON TRACK



#### **EXPECTED OUTCOMES**

• Practises repair strategies during sentence tracking

#### This is a connected discourse tracking activity.

The speaker reads the passage, one sentence at a time. The recipient repeats the sentence. If needed, the recipient uses a repair strategy to facilitate their hearing.

In the first game of the tournament, the team started very well. They beat the host nation Portugal 2-1.


The team then went on to advance all the way to the final. In the final, they had to meet the Portugese team again. Everyone believed that Portugal would win.

Fifty thousand people attended the game which was held in Portugal.


